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the Chief believes it is time to take action. The intersection is one of the most dangerous in the city and has been the scene of fatal mishaps.

During May thousands of drivers here were warned for various infractions elsewhere.

The Chief notes with pleasure that also during May none of the fines imposed by Judge Doran for vice, lottery and gambling offenses were appealed to the Superior Court. Fines in these classifications totaled \$1,225, of which \$375 is in suspended levies.

ALBINE KEROUAC (over) SUCCUMBS AT 33
