

MRS. ANDRE BELANGER

**LEWISTON WOMAN, 73, DIES
SUDDENLY AT HOME—WAS
NATIVE OF GENTILLY, P. Q.**

Mrs. Leda Belanger, 73, widow of Andre Belanger, died suddenly Sunday morning at 2 Grove Street, Lewiston, where she had been making her home with her sister Mrs. Albert (Florida) Forgue. Death was attributed to a heart condition.

Mrs. Belanger was born at Gentilly, P. Q., May 4, 1865, the daughter of Ludger and Eleanor Lafond Houle, and had lived in this community 65 years.

Surviving are a sister, Mrs. Florida Forgues, Lewiston; a brother, Wilfred Houle, Lewiston; and many nieces and nephews.

She was a member of Holy Family Church and the Dames de St. Anne.

DIED

In Lewiston Feb. 13, Mrs. Andrea Belanger, 73. Remains are at the Fortin Funeral Parlor, 70 Horton Street, Lewiston. Funeral services to be held at Holy Family church on Wednesday morning at a time to be announced later. Entombment SS Peter and Paul cemetery.

At least one person has been injured in a series of accidents at the fair ground underpass, Main Street, during the last three days. Mrs. C. Breton, 56, of Waterville, suffered leg bruises and the car in which she was a passenger was considerably damaged, Sunday.

Lewiston police said only one accident, that in which Mrs. Breton was injured, had been reported, but that they had heard of other accidents there. Police went to the scene Saturday night but found cars reported in an accident had been removed.

Residents of the neighborhood blamed the slippery condition of the underpass approaches for the numerous accidents. An ice ridge on the northern approach to the underpass has caused cars to go into skids, to swing entirely around and slam against the high concrete retaining wall near the fair ground entrance. Several automobiles, according to residents, have wound up in this position.

Mrs. Breton was a passenger in a coupe operated by Henry L. Breton, 22, of 116 Star Route, Waterville.
