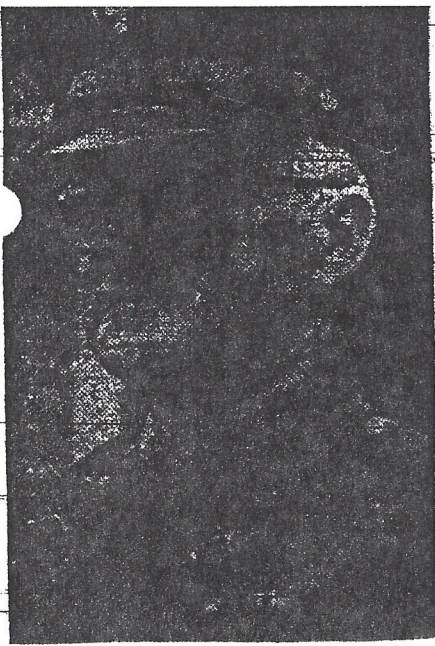




DANA H. ALLEN

Former Officer At Fort Retires

Lieutenant Colonel Dana H. Allen, former commander of the recruit-reception center at Fort Devens, and former executive officer for the Harbor Defenses of New Bedford and Fort Rodman, as retired today after a long illness.

He came to New Bedford to command the 107th Corps Area Service unit at Fort Rodman in February 1941, after serving as instructor of the 179th Infantry, Oklahoma National Guard. In early September 1941, he assumed command of the post temporarily, but was transferred to Fort Devens as Corps Area Service Unit commander to succeed Colonel Albert F. Christie, now a Japanese prisoner of war. Colonel Allen was succeeded in his command by Colonel W. O. Shrum.

Front Resolution

Governor Condemned; Taylor Re-elected Secretary-Treasurer

SPRINGFIELD, Aug. 8 (AP)—

A resolution calling for immediate establishment of a second front met defeat and another asking the A.F.L. to co-operate fully with British and Russian trade unions precipitated sharp comment at the 57th convention of the Massachusetts Federation of Labor.

The "co-operation" resolution was referred at the convention's closing session last night to the State Federation's executive board.

Opposing the resolution, Delegate John J. Kearney of Boston asserted there were no labor unions in Russia, and Harry A. Russell, chairman of the resolutions committee, said it would be time to talk about labor unity when the Russian Government extended to workers the same privileges extended in the United States and England.

"Old Stuff"

In debate on the second-front resolution, Kearney said it was favored by some persons who, prior to the German attack on Russia, were opposed to American rearmament.

Grace Lonergan of the Boston Teachers Union, an advocate of a second front, declared:

"This Soviet-baiting is old stuff and will get us nowhere today. It is the same type of argument used by Fifth Columnists."

Taylor Re-elected

Kenneth I. Taylor won re-election as secretary-treasurer, 299 to 83, over John F. Wade of Lawrence. Nicholas P. Morrissey was unopposed for a fifth term as president.

Earlier, the convention adopted a resolution condemning the labor record of Governor Saltonstall after Morrissey charged the Governor "has no sympathy with labor."
