John Hrusovszky escaped Hungary after the Hungarian Revolution. As a boy, he and others escaped to Germany on a ship named 'Marine Camp'. The boat left Brehmenhaur, Germany on 02 Jan 1957 and arrived in New York on 16 Jan 1957. John was taken to Ft. Dix (then called Camp Killmore), New Jersey. John contacted some relation of his in New York that allegedly owned or worked at a rubber factory. John thinks that person MIGHT have been his father's 1/2 brother. John moved to Illinois where he met Evelyn Van Vleck. They married held a 2nd job at Behren's Machine as a Tool and Die Maker. Life then took John and his family to Arpin, WI where he bought and operated a dairy farm in 1974. Medical issues with his back caused him to sell the farm and move and open a Machine Shop in Auburndale, WI in 1978. Around 1988, he bought another dairy farm in Arpin, WI and farmed until he had to sell the farm due to cancer. Him and Evelyn then moved to Indiana where he drove truck (semi) for a living. On retirement, he moved to Apache Junction, AZ and hauled campers around the country for a few years. His heart was giving him problems and he had to have an artificial valve inserted. He could no longer drive truck at that time and that really seemed to take a toll on him. He passed away about 5 years later. The suffix "-sky" is used to create an adjective from a noun. In surnames it means link to a geographic location, like in German the "von" and the French "de". Hrusovsky means "Somebody from Hrusov". There were 6 towns/villages named Hrusov in Slovakia.
