THREE BABIES ASPHYXIA TED IN YORK STREET HOUSE

Wards of Children's Aid Die in Cots Around Stove Coroner Opens Inquest

One-Month-Old 'Jean' Only Tot to Escape.

DECIDE DEATHS DUE TO COAL GAS

A single funeral arranged by the Children's Aid Society, will be held for the three little victims of today's tragedy on York street, at 11 a.m. Friday, the bodies will be taken to Notre Dame cemetery. The mothers of the two little boys have not yet been located at the funeral home to view the bodies.

Asleep in their cots in the kitchen of a York street house, three babies—two boys and a girl—died in the early hours of the morning from deadly coal gas given off by the stove around which they had been placed to keep warm.

The babies were Renee B. Hillard, 22 months old; Guy Martel, 12 months, and Antoinette Seguin, 14 months, all of whom were being cared for by Mrs. Malvina Kirsnow at 34 York street, under the supervision of the Children's Aid Society.

Death struck at the three children through a simple incident that was of only momentary inconvenience at the time. Ordinarily, Mrs. Kirsnow and the children sleep on the second floor of the house, but last night the furnace went out and Mrs. Kirsnow placed the children in their cots in the kitchen beside the stove, while she and a French baby slept in the dining room adjoining with the door between the two rooms slightly open so that she would know if anything was wrong.

Members of the Kirsnow family were all as much upset as if they had been killed.
