Graveside rites are to be conducted by the Bradley Legion Post. Visitation will be at the funeral home after 2 p.m. Thursday. Mr. Curwick was born on Jan. 8, 1897 at Wellington, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Napoleon Curwick. He was married on June 26, 1926 at Cullom to Edna Murphy who survives.
